Coxes New Beginnings in Seminary

Much has changed since our last newsletter. It is hard to know where to start to bring everything together without writing a book (which we do not have the time to write and most of you do not have the time to read.) On the back is a time line; this will help put the major events in our lives since the last newsletter in perspective.

From our last Newsletter, you will remember that we left Swaziland mid October 2001. From mid October through December we visited supporters, reconnected with family and rested. In January, we started seminary at Dallas Theological Seminary (DTS) with the goal of receiving further training to return to Africa. In addition, both of our fathers have had major heart surgery. Currently, both are doing well.

Readjusting to life in America has been difficult for Donna and Paul. For Nehemiah, Micah Joy and Miriam they have had to adjust to America for the first time. As you remember, Nehemiah was 3 and Micah Joy was 9 months when we went to Africa. Obviously, Micah Joy does not remember living in America. Nehemiah has only faint memories of friends, but no real memory of life in America; learning about wearing shoes at school, Wal-Mart, finding new friends, learning about

baseball and football (Nehemiah was into cricket and soccer), etc.... Add to the above that life in Dallas is very different from life in New Mexico. This is the first time in Paul's life (other than a short 3 month stay in Phoenix) that he has lived away from mountains (Swaziland is a very mountainous country). Can one have withdrawals from mountains?

DTS has been about what was expected with one exception – the amount of reading. Paul has read more in the last three months than he did in the last three years. This summer Paul will be taking his first and second semesters of Greek. Last semester, he took (and passed) Bible Study Methods and Hermeneutics, Old Testament History I (Geneses through Judges), Introduction to Theology and Educational Process of the Church. Whenever school and life get difficult, we remind ourselves that our goal

is to become better equipped to communicate the hope and love of God in whatever culture we find ourselves (Lord willing, an African culture once seminary is complete).


